Because of your support, we began with an expansion of the drop-in that seats more than 400 people. This means our community will no longer

Now we are stepping out in faith to start the second phase, which will provide an additional 50 shelter beds, recovery beds for the health centre and space for mental health and employment services.

All of this, because of you.

This annual report is for you – to show you what you have already achieved, and to cast a vision for what is yet to come.

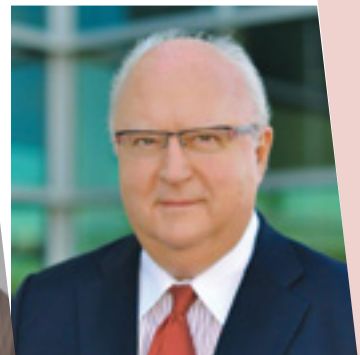

A BRIEF HISTORY OF CHANGING LIVES

Since 1987, your support has provided hope to Winnipeg's poor and homeless community. Here's a short overview of what your investment has achieved.



1987

Suk Woon Lee, a former penitentiary inmate and member of the Korean Nazarene congregation, establishes Siloam Mission at 695 Main Street and offers meals and counseling services.



1990

As demand for services grows, Siloam purchases the building at 707 Main Street.



1999

Siloam is forced to close its doors when the City of Winnipeg expropriates the soup kitchen's property before the 1999 Pan Am Games to make way for Neeginan Park.



2000

Siloam re-opens as a drop-in centre at 564 Main Street, but by December the organization has run out of funds. Dedicated volunteers keep the doors open five days a week to offer hot meals, coffee and clothing.



2011

Siloam purchases The Madison in Wolseley with the help of all three levels of government and begins renovating it to provide supportive housing. It has been home to 85 men and women every year since. Transition Services launches to help guests move forward in their lives through goal setting, weekly meetings, supports and accountability.



2012

Siloam begins offering its Spiritual Care program, connecting guests to faith congregations where they feel comfortable, hosting weekly worship services and organizing memorial services for guests who have lost loved ones.



2014

The Exit Up! Program launches to provide housing, training and life-skills development for Indigenous youth aged 18–25 who are leaving care.



2005

Siloam moves from Main Street into the newly renovated four-storey facility at 300 Princess Street – an answer to prayer to meet the growing needs of the community.



2006

Siloam launches its employment-training program to help people enter the workforce again.



2007

In June, Hannah's Place Emergency Shelter opens its doors to provide overnight shelter to 110 men and women. It's been full every night since.

In August, Siloam opens the Saul Sair Health Centre to address the complex health needs of Winnipeg's inner city.



2010

The Longtin Resource Centre is dedicated to provide art therapy.



2016

Siloam moves 103 people into housing, assists 234 people in getting ID and helps 211 people receive income supports.



2017

Siloam opens a new dining room behind its current building, the first step of a major expansion that makes room for 400 community members. The second phase will create more than 50 additional shelter beds with a separate shelter area for up to 33 women, an expanded health centre, a new mental health area and a centre for transition and employment services.



YOU'VE GIVEN SAFE SHELTER FOR THE NIGHT.

The men and women seeking refuge in our overnight shelter face a moment of crisis when they show up at the door.

With no one else to turn to – and nowhere else to go – we are often the last line of defense for someone who would otherwise spend the night outside.

Hannah's Place Emergency Shelter provides a temporary home for 110 men and women every night.

Our Transition Services team works with community members who use our shelter to help them transition out of their moment of crisis, move forward and reach their full potential.

*The shelter is full every night. Unique stays are measured by the time a guest stays in the shelter. The majority of the 431 men and women who use the shelter spend between 10 days to 3 months in the shelter.

YOU'VE BUILT A COMMUNITY THAT HELPS EACH OTHER.

The drop-in centre at Siloam Mission is a big living room where everyone who walks through our doors gets a cheery hello and a hot cup of coffee.

It is here, over a nutritious warm meal, that we learn the stories of the men and women who rely on our services. From here we refer them to our different programs, be it employment training, healthcare or help with housing.

But beyond nourishment for the body, the drop-in community provides food for the soul. It provides a family for those who need a listening ear, and a shelter from the elements for those weathering a storm of their own.

Over the past year, more groups have committed to preparing and serving a meal than ever before. And more businesses are coming on board every day to donate foods and other urgently needed items.

Our newly opened drop-in centre at 303 Stanley Avenue doubled our previous kitchen space and will increase our capacity to prepare and serve meals. Plus, it provides a much bigger space for our volunteers to serve.

You have served one meal for every minute of the year.

YOU'VE PROVIDED HEALTHCARE AND MENDED WOUNDS.

When you're living on the streets, your health is your most important asset.

Good health is crucial to gaining self-confidence, finding a job, finding housing and staying housed.

Our Saul Sair Health Centre provides head-to-toe health care for guests of Siloam Mission.

From everyday care for wounds, heat stroke and fever to the maintenance of a chronic disease like diabetes, the health centre attends to thousands of visits every year.

Since its inception 10 years ago, the clinic has grown to offer optometry, podiatry, dental services and allied health such as chiropractic

care, physiotherapy, massage therapy, along with health and wellness care through our on-site gym.

Staffed by volunteer medical professionals, the focus is to keep clients out of hospital emergency rooms and integrate their care with the other services Siloam Mission offers.

In the last year, the health centre hosted students from five post-secondary schools for their practicum placement.

A planned expansion will see the health centre add recovery beds, shower facilities and more room for physical and massage therapy.

Every visit in our health centre that replaces an emergency room visit saves the Manitoba government \$618.

YOU'VE HELPED PEOPLE EXIT HOMELESSNESS.

Finding a home and staying housed are two of the biggest challenges for any person using our services.

That's where the Transition Services team gets to work, investing much of their time and resources in helping people successfully exit out of homelessness.

The team focuses on two main priorities: working with people who have used Siloam's shelter for an extended time, and providing supports for clients who have moved into housing.

Along with Transition Services, our Spiritual Care program connects people with faith congregations they feel comfortable with to meet their spiritual needs.

Like all of us, clients who have moved on continue to have ups and downs along their journey. Your ongoing support helps the Transition Services team be there for the downs while working to create more ups.

A SNAPSHOT OF TRANSITION SERVICES CLIENTS:

- 75% are men
- 37% are indigenous
- 63% struggle with mental health concerns
- 21% have a physical disability
- 29% have a cognitive impairment
- 48% struggle with addictions

YOU'VE GIVEN A JOB TO SOMEONE WHO NEEDED IT.

Having a job is about more than just getting paid. It also creates dignity, builds a healthy self-esteem and provides purpose.

A reliable job can be the difference between living on the streets and having a place of your own.

But finding employment can be almost impossible for people living on the streets.

Our two employment training programs – MOST and Building Futures – prepare men and women to enter the workforce while gaining new skills and earning a fair wage.

This year participants of the MOST (Mission: Off the Streets Team) kept the sidewalks in Winnipeg's downtown clean in the summer and free of ice in the winter – a much appreciated contribution to the community.

Participants who perform well on the team become candidates for Building Futures, where they prepare for the workforce through vocational training, computer training, resume building and interview skills.

YOU'VE PROVIDED A HOME FOR SOMEONE WHO NEEDED A SECOND CHANCE.

A home is more than just four walls and a roof. It's a feeling of belonging, safety and comfort – a little corner of the world to call your own.

The Madison provides recovery-based housing for men and women who are rebuilding their lives and moving forward.

Some stay here for a while; others use it as a stepping stone – but all of them proudly call it “home.”

Volunteers provide a community of support, while residents encourage each other and work together to maintain their home and volunteer in the Wolseley community.

Residents also include Indigenous youth aging out of the care of Child and Family Services and moving through our Exit Up! program designed to help them live independently with success.

BECAUSE OF YOU WE CAN MAKE ROOM.

Over the last year we have been hard at work turning a vision for more services that help people transition out of homelessness into a reality.

The MAKE ROOM capital campaign will fund a major expansion of our programing space and services, including the current construction of a new dining hall at 303 Stanley Avenue.

The new dining room, just behind our main building on 300 Princess Street, will seat more than 400 people for a meal and has room for more than 100 people to line up inside. That means this winter, nobody will have to line up outside in the frigid temperatures to get a warm meal.

We are about to break ground on the second phase – a two-storey link between the two buildings. The new space will add 50+ emergency shelter beds, including a private shelter for up to 33 women.

It will also be home to an expanded health centre, new mental health centre and a new Progressive Services centre that includes transition and employment services to help people move forward.

The federal and provincial governments recently invested \$3 million *each* to help us get there. We are stepping out in faith and trusting in the generosity of Manitobans when we officially launch the public campaign in 2018.

The fundraising goal for the campaign is \$17 million, with current contributions and commitments at \$12.6 million.

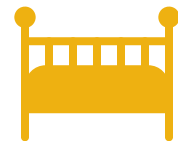

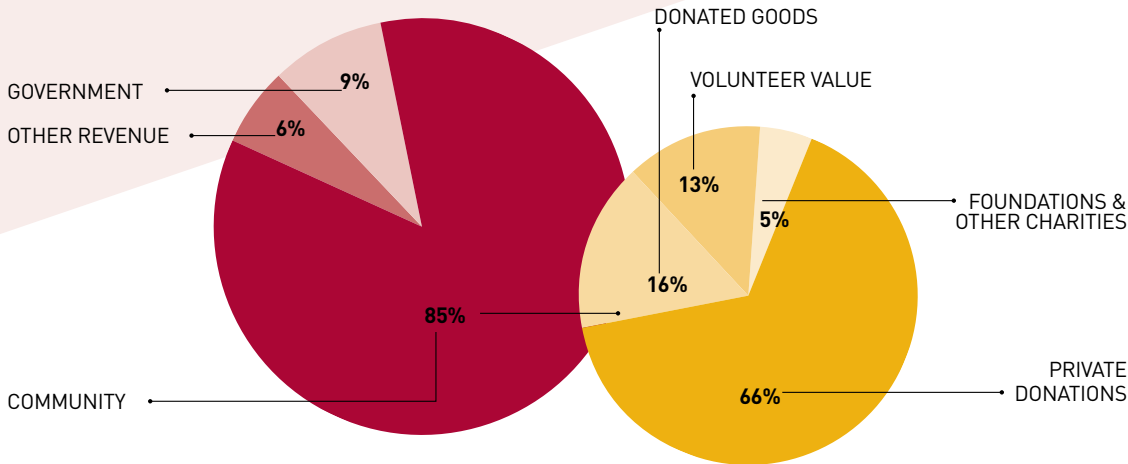

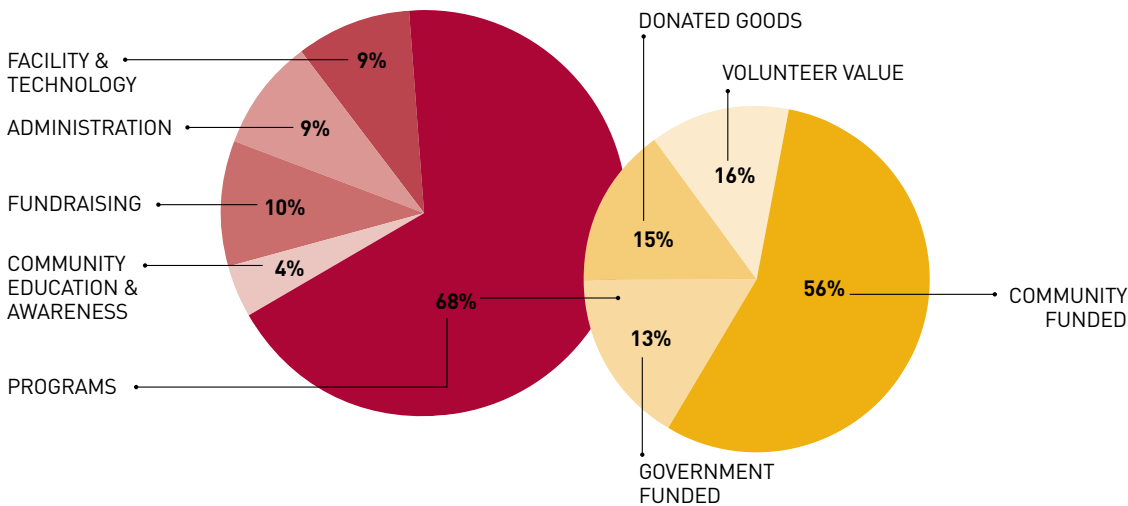
